Zingnun lives in the remote hills of Bangladesh. She has struggled to support her family due to her disability. Zingnun would weave wool to make blankets and other handicrafts to sell in her village. But her products looked like everyone else's. She wasn't making enough profit to support her family.

Zingnun's life took a positive turn when she participated in handicrafts training through GMP Relief and Development partner, the Community Advancement Forum (CAF).

The Community Advancement Forum supports women and vulnerable farmers by providing handicraft marketing and design training. They create communal experiences to make blankets and to preserve traditional skills. They teach people business planning, which empowers them to sell their products for a better profit.

After participating in the training, Zingnun said her "design became very unique and in high demand." Our partners trained 60 women in 2023. They want to reach 1000 women and vulnerable farmers. This goal highlights how significant the need is for this life-changing training.

Before the training, Zingnun earned a 15 percent profit on her products at the local market. Now, she is making 30 percent!

With newfound confidence and unique products, Zingnun can support her family. "It is very much supportive to my family," she shared.

Participating in the Mission of Love

Welcome to 2024.

I'm genuinely excited about all God has in store for the Global Mission Partners community this year.

In my prayers and reflections over recent weeks, I've found God reminding me of his "mission of love" to the world (John 3:16-17).

One of my all-time favourite missiologists is David Bosch, most famous for writing the book Transforming Mission. The first time I read this book was slowly over two years because its content was so rich. Bosch wrote in this book, "To participate in mission is to participate in the movement of God's love toward people, since God is a fountain of sending love."

Of course, Paul, in his first letter to the Corinthians, also famously made this point quite poetically.

If we speak in tongues, have the gift of prophecy, fathom all mysteries and knowledge, have faith that can move mountains, or give to people in poverty but do not have love... we are nothing or gain nothing. "I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal." (1 Cor 13:1-3).

Paul continues to describe what love is:

"Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonour others; it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, and it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails." (1 Cor 13:4-8)

It's easy to read these words at weddings and write them in cards to loved ones. But these are Paul's words, a leader of the early church spreading the good news of Jesus throughout pagan Asia-minor (Syria, Lebanon, Turkey, Cyprus, Greece and Malta) all the way to Rome.

This is an agape-sacrificial type of love that he's writing about and encouraging the church to embody as it participates in God's mission.

Our partners are inspiring examples of sharing God's love in desperate settings.

Amidst significant food shortages in Zimbabwe, Christian Care is training farmers for improved food security.

As refugees from neighbouring conflicts shelter in South Sudan, Christian Mercy International feeds and cares for over 150 families.

While low-caste families pick through rubbish for their survival, Hosanna Ministries is providing early education to children to break the cycle of poverty.

Among Indigenous youth struggling to find their place in this world, Dareton Youth and Community Centre provides a safe place to find community.

God's love is the life-changing balm for those living amidst hard places and challenging circumstances.

Today, may we draw from that fountain of God's love and consider ways to share it liberally as our ongoing participation in God's mission to the world this year.

Petros did not have school shoes or socks. He would walk with his eldest sister 5km daily to school in Zimbabwe. Without protection for his feet from the dirt and rocks. At home, their father was abusive, and their mother had partial paralysis from a stroke. Petros and his siblings learned to care for themselves very early in life.

When Petros's mother passed away, he was 11 years old. "All our relatives disappeared after the funeral," he said. Yet, Petros was not alone. His teacher knew about the family's need for support and contacted one of the leaders at Khayelihle Children's Village (KCV).

KCV provides a loving home to orphaned or vulnerable children like Petros. At KCV, the kids live in family groups of various ages in each of the five households. House mothers, fathers and aunties look after the children. They are loved by the staff, fed, clothed and have access to a good education. Where possible, KCV also seeks out the extended family of the children that come to them and helps reunite them where it is safe and supportive for the children.

Petros and his siblings found a new family at KCV. "When we arrived at KCV, it was like a dream heaven on earth," Petros reflected. It was the first time the children watched TV or played sports. Each day, the KCV bus would take the children to and from school, and Petros never had to walk to school again. "I remember how I cried when I was given a full uniform with a satchel at KCV. It was packed with a lunchbox full of food for school with a bottled drink with juice inside. That, to me, was God answering my prayers." Petros had everything he needed.

Living at KCV, Petros finally felt like a child. It gave him hope and security that he had never known before. KCV also gave him the foundation he needed to succeed academically and professionally.

Petros completed high school and earned a Bachelor of Science in Psychology with honours. He is the founder and managing director of a car wash business today. He has a vision to help youth off the streets and provide them with jobs. God has blessed him with a beautiful family, including a wife and two daughters.

Petros continued to remember KCV many years after he left. We were told he has generously blessed the children's village by delivering essential groceries and goodies for the kids' lunchboxes.

"Today, I am a graduate and entrepreneur making a difference in the world because of you," Petros shared. "I thank you all for your continued support towards our family and KCV. Thank you all. God bless."
